These last two years have been remarkably eventful for the world, Oregon and our foundation. This annual report covers both 2020 and 2021, as last year our focus was on the change and challenges of the moment.



In our 2019 report, we announced the retirement of our longtime CEO Cynthia Addams. We spent nearly a year in the search process for our new CEO, Carol Cheney. Carol joined us in April 2021, coming into a completely virtual environment with complicated new funding streams. She has done a magnificent job, continuing our collaborative work structure. I thank her for the inspiring leadership during a time that has been difficult for so many.

Our staff has undergone several other changes over the past two years. Cindy Knowles, our Director of Programs, retired and Marlena Willette, our Executive Office Administrator, left last year. We appreciate their many contributions to the work of the Foundation. Jackie Murphy stepped in as Director of Programs. We also welcomed three new staff members: Hannah Licht is our new Executive Finance Office Administrator; Lauren Waudé is our new Program Officer; and Kweli Jaoko is our Program Assistant. I look forward to working with them in the future.

We faced and accomplished much during these last two years. We allocated an additional \$6,671,700 to support organizations with COVID-19 requests. In addition, we created a \$6 million allocation over three years to support the Black community.

We brought online an additional funding stream to support Oregonians affected by the wildfires in September 2020. We also continued our responsive grantmaking throughout the state over the past two years.

I am thankful for our entire staff and their incredible work during this time. They navigated additional and more complex funding, all while moving to and working in a new virtual environment. Their hard work, deep caring and thoughtful analysis allow us to make grants that have the greatest impact to those people in the most need, those who are often marginalized by society.

This year we will bring on a new community trustee and move into a strategic planning process. We will alter our funding cycles, taking care to minimize the effect on our grantees.

During this time of so many unexpected and significant societal issues, I am thankful to see all of the inspiring work that the nonprofit community is doing to improve the lives of people in Oregon.

I never imagined that 31 years after entering the nonprofit sector I'd be fortunate enough to lead an Oregon foundation. Nor did I imagine that this opportunity would occur during such a momentous time for our sector, our state and our world.

My deep love for the nonprofit sector began in 1991, when I found myself working for a domestic violence intervention organization, Clackamas Women's Services. We were a scrappy bunch, moving the organization's work forward with idealism, a passion for women's and children's rights, and the willingness to put our hearts and souls into the job.

I have carried that love throughout my career, but never more than now. Today I have the opportunity to learn about so many organizations making an incredible difference during such challenging times. It's hard for me to imagine what we, as a state, would have done in these last two years without the work, dedication and service of our nonprofit workforce.

Consider for a moment, an Oregon without these people and organizations. Who would have helped deploy thousands of vaccines, especially to small rural communities without a health care infrastructure, or to people who experience systemic barriers, such as language access or 9-to-5 clinic hours? Who would have been able to quickly reorganize and coordinate efforts to gather and distribute food, rental assistance and money to people experiencing job loss and food and housing insecurity in communities ravaged by the pandemic or wildfires? Who could have quickly collaborated and organized to help Afghan refugees fleeing the Taliban

or worked tirelessly to keep immigrant families safe in the face of anti-immigrant rhetoric and action? Who would have created ways to channel our anger and grief over blatant and persistent anti-Black murders and anti-Asian attacks, resulting in powerful policy change? Who would have found ways to support families led by women or single parents who've had to leave the workforce simply to care for their children?

Without nonprofit organizations and the dedicated, passionate people who work for them, it's hard to imagine the state we'd be in now. Recent data indicate that we are seeing a "Great Resignation" in all of our sectors; nonprofits are no exception. I believe our committed nonprofit workers have borne more of the brunt of the calamities of the last two years than any other workforce. Thank you.

It's such an honor to be in a position and place where I can continue to support the sector I love and to work with a Board of Trustees and staff who feel the same way. The stories you'll read in this 2020-2021 annual report are only a few of the hundreds we could have highlighted. They will speak volumes more than I can about the heart and soul of the nonprofit sector. I hope you'll join me in celebrating and supporting them!

Initiatives targeting specific critical issues bolster our core grantmaking. Over the past two years, we added initiatives to address Black equity and COVID-19 response.

Black Equity

The Black Equity Movement is our funding program to address anti-Black systemic racism in Oregon. In 2020 we allocated \$2 million per year for three years, in addition to our other grantmaking. We have been engaging members of the Black community to help us design the funding stream moving forward.

COVID-19 Response

To support Oregonians affected by the pandemic, we allocated \$4.65 million in 2020 and \$2 million in 2021 to COVID-19 response. We continue to be as flexible and adaptive as possible with our grantees as they respond to the ongoing pandemic.

Wildfire Response

Between September 2020 and May 2021, we awarded \$300,000 in grants to support a mix of organizations providing emergency wildfire relief efforts in impacted areas and \$400,000 towards a \$5 million collaborative fund, housed at the Oregon Community Foundation, for the longer-term rebuilding effort.

Immigrants and Refugees

The Oregon Immigrant and Refugee Funders Collaborative (OIRFC) is a partnership of Meyer Memorial Trust, Oregon Community Foundation, Pride Foundation and The Collins Foundation. Its purpose is to ensure a coordinated, collaborative and nimble funding approach to address emerging and urgent issues impacting immigrants and refugees in Oregon, and to support the organizations responding to these issues. In 2020 the collaborative expanded to support a community-based pandemic response for organizations whose work also addresses the original intention of the program.

Small and Emerging Organizations

In 2018 we launched an initiative for small and emerging organizations rooted in communities of color – including LGBTQ+ people of color, people of color with disabilities, and people of color who are immigrants and refugees. The invitation-only initiative provides general operating support and technical assistance funds to a cohort of nine culturally specific organizations with budgets under \$200,000.

Doing What They Do Best

The events of the past two years confronted us with a momentous reframing of our world: a reckoning of the depth of racism in our society; the devastating effects of climate change; a global pandemic; and ongoing and emergent needs of immigrants and refugees. Headlines have translated into tremendous change for organizations in every area including basic services, the arts, health, racial justice, and advocacy.

If there was one throughline over the past 24 months, it was the efforts of nonprofit organizations across our state to respond to the needs of Oregon's communities. As a funder and partner, our mandate is to support organizations to do what they do best.

In 2020, we increased our total awards by \$6,227,245 (62%) and in 2021 by \$4,850,885 (48%) as compared to 2019 awards. We introduced timely initiatives — specifically to support the COVID-19 response and the movement for Black equity — and leaned in to our initiatives to support small and emerging organizations and those serving immigrant and refugee populations. [See list to left] We also worked closely with other funders in the state to get resources to communities devastated by wildfires as quickly and seamlessly as possible.

Along the way, we learned even more about our grantees as they shared their stories of change, creativity and resilience. We were constantly amazed at their good work in the face of so many challenges. We think you will be, too.

Marion Polk Food Share

Shaking up service because of COVID

2020 Grant: \$40,000 to support operations and food pantry programs serving low-income residents of rural Woodburn.

2021 Grants: \$40,000 for ongoing support of the AWARE Project, a Woodburn-based food pantry serving 16,000 families each year. \$50,000 in COVID-19 emergency funds to support recovery from an arson fire, which destroyed the building housing their Woodburn food pantry.

COVID-19 is not a good thing. But some good things have come out of responding to the pandemic. “COVID shook things up,” says Rick Gaupo, president and CEO of Marion Polk Food Share. “I think we are serving the community better because we had to change.”

Marion Polk Food Share endeavors to end hunger in Marion and Polk counties. The organization collects and distributes food to more than 100 local partners, including food pantries and meal sites, and delivers Meals on Wheels to homebound seniors and adults with disabilities.

Pre-pandemic, shelf-stable food was delivered directly to food pantries, but many fresh goods were distributed via pantry volunteers who “shopped” at the warehouse. Social distancing shut down that model. Marion Polk Food Share added fresh food to their deliveries. They added to their fleet, hired more drivers, and reorganized their warehouse. “We were able to get more food out to the community faster and we took the burden of distribution off of the pantries,” says Gaupo.

And because Marion Polk Food Share was controlling more of the distribution, they began to evaluate that distribution in a more equitable way. “We saw the people who were not benefitting from the federal aid programs – those who were undocumented. We asked how we could get more food to the pantries who serve them,” he says.

Marion Polk Food Share also started mobile pantry visits to low-income mobile home parks and farm sites. They increased home-delivered groceries. Using their Meals on Wheels logistical software and network of drivers, they were able to extend delivery of grocery boxes to more seniors who didn’t require meal preparation and single moms with kids in the Headstart program.

“Equity was and is an important value for us,” says Gaupo. “COVID made us better at it.”



Imagine Black Futures

Imagining the alternatives

2020 Grant: \$100,000 through the Collins Foundation Black Equity Movement (BEM) initiative to support general operations and additional community services.

2021 Grants: \$10,000 for technical assistance from the BEM initiative; \$1,200 grant for participation in the Collins Foundation-hosted community engagement sessions to collect input from community partners about the BEM initiative.



“We are going beyond just saying we serve the Black community to really defining who’s impacted most and how we can focus on creating solutions together,” says Joy Alise Davis, executive director of Imagine Black Futures. “It requires a lot of patience, understanding and holding each other accountable, then moving forward, learning from our mistakes and being better.”

Imagine Black Futures (formerly Portland African American Leadership Forum) is an all-inclusive, Black-led organization for Portland-based community members interested in advocating for a city where people of African descent enjoy the rights, resources and recognition to be a thriving, resilient and connected community. Imagine Black Futures helps the Black community imagine the alternatives they deserve and build their political participation and leadership to achieve those alternatives.

“Like most Black organizations, locally and nationally, we are typically under-resourced,” says Davis. “We know this work is a marathon. We value sustainability. We want to be here for the long haul and have the systems in place to successfully engage



with the community and move policy ideas. Funding to build that internal capacity has been huge.”

The “long haul” is full of opportunities. In the summer of 2020 Imagine Black Futures worked with other Black organizations to realize a \$15 million decrease in the Portland Police Bureau budget, the end of a TriMet/Police Bureau agreement, and the dismantling of the Portland Police Bureau Gun Violence Reduction Team.

“When slavery needed to end, we didn’t reform it, we ended it,” she says. “We have brilliant people in the world. We can do better than our public safety systems. To do that, we need to reimagine public safety completely, without restrictions.”

Imagine Black Futures also lead in organizing Black-led organizations across the state to send 91,000 emails to state elected officials. The result of the collective effort led to \$62 million in CARES Act funding directed to the Black community.

“This is an opportunity to pilot new ideas and have folks who are most impacted by issues really be a part of the solutions and world-building in this phase,” says Davis.

Listo

*Dreaming
dreams bigger
than fears*

2021 Grant: \$35,000 in COVID-19 emergency funds to create hybrid and distance learning options for program participants.



“Many of our Listo families have come to a new country,” says Patty Gutiérrez. “They have big dreams. And those dreams are bigger than their fears.”

Listo Family Literacy, a program of Southern Oregon Head Start, provides culturally specific learning opportunities for Latinx families in Jackson County. Infants, toddlers, preschoolers and older children, ages 6-15, learn while their parents study English and adult basic education classes in Spanish.

The pandemic forced Listo to close its doors in March 2020. Teachers were laid off. The remaining staff surveyed parents to find out how they could help. “Every family was at a different level of need,” says Gutiérrez, “But they wanted to learn.”

Listo staff connected with local partners to supply food boxes. They created a distance-learning service model and new program components. But in September, just as registration for the new online classes began, the “once-in-a-generation” Alameda fire burned through the community. A third of Listo families, including Listo staff, were affected.



“We just did our best to provide for them,” Gutiérrez says. “It was hard for everyone.” Listo continued to plan learning options. By November, they were able to offer distance-learning as well as a new online support group.

Many families had no home, no income and lacked services. “I’ll be darned if people didn’t show up for their classes and meetings on their cell phones,” says Rachelle Schaaf, Listo development director. “They wanted to be there. They wanted to connect.” Listo now offers loaner iPads for families.

Distance learning continues with story times and joyful check-ins for infants and toddlers. Preschool-age kids prepare for kindergarten. Older kids get individual homework help from teachers – all of it online. Parents of each age group receive packets of age-appropriate learning activities and participate on the Zoom sessions with younger children. Parents learn, as well, in literacy, wellness and mental health sessions.

Wraparound services remain, including a parent-led monthly food box program and a bilingual family advocate for fire survivors. “We created our plan,” says Gutiérrez. “But what we learned is that any plan can be different tomorrow.”

Quest Center

Meeting the needs of the community

2020 Grants: \$100,000 to support a collaborative project replicating its WISH (non-opioid pain management services) and SUD (substance abuse disorder) programs at the Miracles Club for the African American community. \$25,000 in COVID-19 emergency funds to support operations and increase mental health services to address emotional and health care needs of transgender and nonbinary communities facing increased isolation and anxiety during the pandemic.



“Quest meets the needs of the community. That should be our bumper sticker,” says Dr. David Eisen, executive director of Quest Center for Integrative Health. “The community lets us know what it needs, and we try to meet that need.” Such was the case with the collaboration between Quest and the Miracles Club, a recovery center serving Portland’s African American community.

Quest Center is a nonprofit wellness center that provides multidisciplinary and integrative healthcare in a community-based setting, serving mostly people with low incomes, people living with HIV, and the LGBTQ+ community. Their WISH pain management program is a medical and behavioral program designed to treat chronic pain, predominantly using non-opioid interventions.

In 2018, the Miracles Club approached Quest with a request: replicate Quest’s WISH and other substance abuse disorder programs for their community. The two organizations put together a plan to begin culturally specific treatment, with a goal of having the Miracles Club fully licensed and staffed with their own credentialed specialists.



Then the pandemic hit and the needs of their communities transformed.

“Isolation is deadly for addiction,” says Dr. Eisen. “Especially for marginalized people, trauma increases heavily.” Quest quickly responded to support their clients. They began telemedicine appointments with therapists, counselors and medication managers. Hands-on acupuncture was temporarily halted as online groups learned to treat themselves by placing small magnets at pressure points on their ears. Quest provided no-contact food box deliveries and held socially distanced get-togethers in the parking lot for their community.

Although the Miracles Club plans slowed, the partnership continued. A Miracles Club staffer interned with Quest, working toward her alcohol and drug counselor certification.

“We just have to keep moving forward and doing what we can do,” says Dr. Eisen. “And understand that the safety of staff and participants is of the utmost importance.”

DisOrient Asian American Film Festival of Oregon

*Learning from
our stories*

2020 Grant: \$10,000 to provide a platform to share API voices and stories focusing on inclusion and social justice; build connections and community by facilitating conversations on issues of race, gender, inclusion, cultural experiences, human rights and social justice.

2021 Grant: Two-year grant of \$32,800 for general operations to support 2022 programming (a virtual festival plus two additional screenings) and hire interns to support digital communications and strategic planning.



“The magic is that we bring people together in one space,” says Pamela Quan, executive director of DisOrient Asian American Film Festival of Oregon. “We experience films together. We listen to impactful discussions. We learn from each other. Often we meet people we would normally not meet and have really in-depth conversations.”

DisOrient Asian American Film Festival, located in Eugene, connects audiences with films from Asian, Asian American and Pacific Islander communities. Representation to date includes multicultural Asian American, Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander and LGBTQ+ actors, directors and writers, and films and narratives about immigration, culture, identity, health, history and equity.

Opening night 2020 coincided with Oregon’s initial COVID-19 social-distancing guidelines. Some filmmakers couldn’t fly in. Volunteers, especially the many over age 60, were encouraged to stay home. Receptions were cancelled. Seats were roped off. Still, the show went on.



A year later, DisOrient 2021 went completely online. The 2022 film festival will be a hybrid event. But the pivot from live to online is not the only story of the past two years. With the pandemic came an increase in anti-Asian bias and racism.

“The increase of anti-Asian violence and rhetoric has caused a lot of pain and outrage in our community,” says Quan. “We’ve been showing films for 16 years. We know these stories are out there, but they aren’t broadly known. If they were, we believe they would promote awareness and understanding.”

Films presented show a history of injustice and racism towards immigrants and BIPOC communities. They depict struggles, fears, loss and disappointments, but also successes, love, family and hope. “It’s an underscoring of our common humanity,” she says. The 2022 hybrid festival will roughly double to 80 films, giving access to more filmmakers and stories than ever. “We want people to hear these stories so that they get to know us and appreciate the broad spectrum of our narratives.”

Boost Oregon

*Vaccinating
out of love*

2020 Grant: \$20,000 to provide culturally specific vaccine education to parents, medical clinics and community health workers primarily serving African American, Latinx and immigrant and refugee communities in Clackamas, Deschutes, Lane, Multnomah and Washington counties.

2021 Grant: \$25,000 of COVID-19 emergency funds to continue and expand their education focused on COVID-19 vaccines.



“I wanted to build a place for parents to spread accurate information about vaccines,” says Nadine Gartner, founding executive director of Boost. “I wanted to connect parents who are genuinely confused about vaccines with doctors and nurses and other medical providers that would take the time to listen to them.” That was 2012.

Today Boost Oregon is a parent-led organization that empowers people to make science-based vaccine decisions for themselves, their families and the community.

Just prior to the pandemic, Boost Oregon was specifically cultivating relationships with more African American, Latinx, Slavic, Somali and Vietnamese families in Clackamas, Deschutes, Lane, Multnomah and Washington counties. “We identified community members who were already trusted messengers and provided them with information,” she says. “We took their feedback to create materials that would be better received by their communities.”

Grant funding allowed Boost Oregon to expand their printed information to six languages and develop other educational tools supporting these communities.

“After the pandemic hit, we quickly came up with a new mission statement. Now we serve people across the lifespan,” says Gartner. “We educate about vaccines for adults and children.” Much of their work during the pandemic focused on COVID-19 vaccines. As of September 2021, they had served around 166,000 members of the public and medical providers in Oregon through their live events, printed materials and videos.

“We’re trying to change the culture of immunization from one of fear to one of love,” says Gartner. “I want people to view immunization as an act of love for themselves when they are taking care of their own health for their babies, when they’re choosing to immunize their babies against vaccine-preventable diseases, and also for the greater community, for those who can’t be vaccinated. We need to build healthy communities.”

Rogue Climate

*Building power
in rural
communities*

2020 Grant: \$45,000 to support operations to assist in rebuilding the Phoenix-Talent community through a climate justice lens, primarily serving Latinx communities and those most impacted by the Almeda fire, and strengthening the clean energy and climate justice movement by engaging BIPOC communities and people living on low incomes in Coos, Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties.

2021 Grant: \$20,000 of COVID-19 emergency funds to support operations, vaccination and COVID-19 outreach and basic needs programs serving individuals living on low incomes, individuals with disabilities, and Latinx communities in rural Jackson and Josephine counties.



Ask Hannah Sohl, executive director of Rogue Climate, about the organization’s biggest achievements over the past two years. She describes helping pass the three bills that made up the Oregon Clean Energy Opportunity campaign, some of the strongest clean energy legislation in the country. She explains the part Rogue Climate played in defeating the Jordan Cove LNG Export Facility and Fracked Gas Pipeline Project after 15 years of organizing. Then she begins to talk about the Almeda fire and how her community came together to respond. “We’re really about building power in our community,” she says. And that’s where the three undertakings converge.

Rogue Climate’s mission is to empower Southern Oregon communities most impacted by climate change to win climate justice by organizing for clean energy, sustainable jobs and a healthy environment.

On the morning of September 8, 2020, the Almeda Fire swept through the Rogue Valley, destroying more than 2,600 homes between Ashland, Talent, Phoenix and Medford. It was the most destructive wildfire in Oregon’s recorded history. “Thousands of people were displaced by the fire, a fire fueled by climate change,” says Sohl. “The fire disproportionately



impacted people living on low incomes or with disabilities, seniors, communities of color and renters.”

Even though Rogue Climate’s office burned in the fire, the organization’s response to the need in the community was swift. Almost immediately, they had a mutual aid site set up for community members and organizations to come together to help.

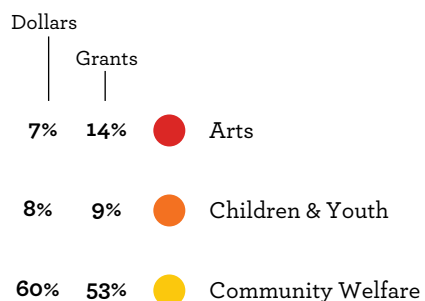
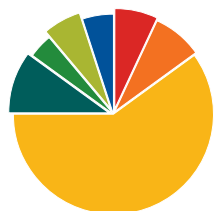
“The long-term investment in organizing was critical,” says Sohl. “We’d had practice organizing, both as an organization and as a community, to address Jordan Cove LNG and other issues. That made our community stronger and able to respond more quickly to the fire.” Sohl calls it “organizing muscle memory.”

With thousands of people still displaced, the organizing and day-to-day work has not stopped. Community members and organizations continue to support people living in FEMA neighborhoods and temporary housing. Sohl says, “The work is very hard, but taking action together is an important part of healing.”

2020 Grant Totals

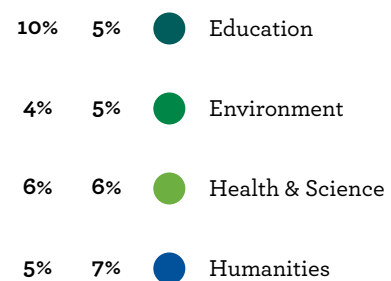
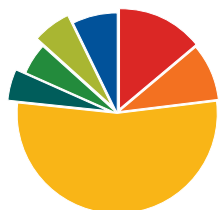
Total Dollars

Number of grants awarded: **356**



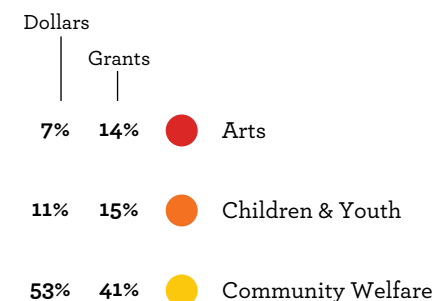
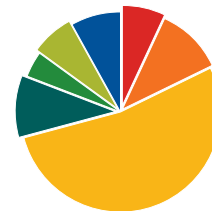

2021 Grant Totals

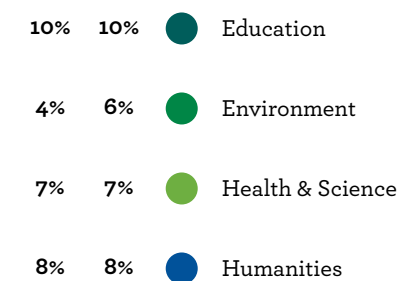
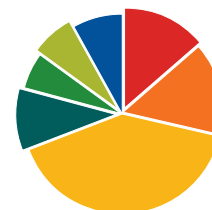
Total Dollars
